## WHAT: Draft Onsite Wastewater Treatment Systems (Septic Systems) Policy

 The State Water Resources Control Board's (State Water Board) has drafted a new policy to meet the legal mandate that requires the State Water Board to develop statewide standards for septic systems, also known as onsite wastewater treatment systems (OWTS). This proposed statewide policy is designed to ensure that surface waters and ground waters are safe for beneficial uses. **BACKGROUND**: The State Water Board began work on this latest policy following public workshops conducted in 2008. As a result of public feedback, the State Water Board went back to the drawing board with the goal of developing standards that meet the mandate to protect surface and groundwater quality while impacting the minimum number of OWTS owners. With this draft proposed policy, it is expected that the majority of OWTS owners in the state will not be affected by the new standards.
