SUBJECT: DRAFT QUESTIONS ADDRESSED IN THE QUESTIONS AND

ANSWERS DOCUMENT ON EX PARTE COMMUNICATIONS BEING

PREPARED BY THE OFFICE OF CHIEF COUNSEL

The members of the State Water Resources Control Board have requested an updated document explaining the legal requirements associated with ex parte communications. After meetings with a variety of stakeholders, I have decided to address the issue through a question and answer document that will be more useful and usable to the members of the state and regional water boards. The preliminary list of questions is set forth below.

Accompanying the question and answer document will be a flow chart, with each decision point referencing specific questions. A mock up of that flow chart is also included below. The flow chart is not final, and the responsive questions are not specifically identified, because the questions remain in flux.




Figure 1: Model Ex Parte Flow Chart
