SUBJECT: Resolution to Provide Financial Incentives in Response to the Governor's

Drought Proclamation for Near-Term Recycled Water Projects—Agenda item

#3, Board Meeting of March 18, 2014

Chair Marcus and Members:

The City of Turlock is pleased to provide comments on the proposed resolution to provide funding incentives for the Clean Water State Revolving Fund (CWSRF) program directed to incentivize near term recycled water projects. The City of Turlock, in partnership with the City of Modesto and Del Puerto Water District, has developed the North Valley Regional Recycled Water Project (NVRRWP); a major recycled water project that would benefit greatly from the proposed terms.

At build out, the NVRRWP will provide over 50,000 acre feet of recycled water to Del Puerto Water District via the Delta Mendota Canal for use on permanent crops and row crops in this CVP water dependent District. Additionally, this recycled water will be conveyed to USFWS wildlife refuges to augment limited water supplies for these valuable migratory bird refuges during the winter months. Currently, the NVRRWP is in the early phases of the EIR/EIS process and expects to begin design as early as 2015, with the project completed in 2018. Upon completion, this will be the largest recycled water project in the Central Valley benefiting both agriculture and the environment. We look forward to this new funding opportunity and the financial benefit these funds will provide in making this project feasible.

As an agency that has two CWSRF loans, we support adoption of the proposed resolution, which will assist in moving recycled water projects forward more quickly to provide much needed water supply benefits. In addition to the financing terms, we ask the Board to exercise flexibility to address other loan terms and conditions that may constitute barriers to project applicants.

These include:

- Senior Lien Debt: Consider the overall credit-worthiness of a given agency rather than a strict standard that new CWSRF loans be senior to other agency debt.
- Repayment Schedules: Allow agencies to request and justify "customized" schedules based on their unique circumstances rather than amortize the loan over the repayment period so that annual debt service payments are the same in each year.
- Refinancing: Allow agencies with current 20-year CWSRF loans to be refunded with the longer term loans and allow open market "bridge loans" to initiate a needed project while awaiting approval of a CWSRF loan.

We appreciate the State Water Board moving forward to incentivize new recycled water projects that will provide reliable, sustainable, and drought proof water supplies for our community.
