This Change Sheet identifies the revisions made on the proposed Resolution directing staff to develop beneficial uses pertaining to tribal traditional and cultural, tribal subsistence fishing, and subsistence fishing. CHANGES TO THE DRAFT STATE WATER BOARD RESOLUTION:

Page Numbering

Add page numbers 1-3 on each page of the resolution.

Page 2, INSERT NEW recital 8 AND RENUMBER EXISTING 8 AND FOLLOWING ACCORDINGLY:

8. A water quality objective specifies the level of protection reasonably necessary to protect a beneficial use. A water quality objective for one beneficial use may be sufficiently protective of other beneficial uses. As a result, even when new beneficial uses are designated for a water body, that does not necessarily mean that additional restrictions on waste discharges will be necessary. Existing water quality objectives for an existing beneficial use may be sufficient to protect the newly added beneficial use.

Page 3, INSERT NEW recital 16:

16. The beneficial uses that the State Water Board would consider at the end of the public process contemplated by this resolution are for purposes of the Porter-Cologne Act. Beneficial uses under the Porter-Cologne Act are distinct from the statutory and common law beneficial uses applicable to appropriative water rights.

Page 3, resolve 3:

3. Directs State Water Board staff to utilize the applicable public participation process when developing the beneficial use categories and seek input from representatives of tribes, environmental justice organizations, the regulated community, and all other interested entities and individuals. Upon receiving substantial public participation and input from interested persons, the board further directs staff to bring an item (no later than the end of Summer 2016) to provide an update on the input received for the board to consider and to provide further direction, if appropriate.

Page 3, resolve 4:

4. <u>Unless direction is otherwise provided</u>, <u>Wwill</u> consider adopting the beneficial use categories and definitions proposed by staff as part of the Mercury Amendment to the statewide Water Quality Control Plan for Inland Surface Waters, Enclosed Bays and Estuaries, no later than April 2017, to create a consistent set of beneficial uses to be used by the Water Boards.
