CALIFORNIA WATER SUPPLY STRATEGY – DIVISION OF WATER RIGHTS

Water Rights Modernization (Action 4.3)

Updating Water Rights Data for California (UPWARD): The Division of Water Rights began decommissioning its electronic Water Rights Information Management System (eWRIMS) on June 9, 2025. Data in eWRIMS will no longer be updated, but the public can still search for information. The Division plans to launch an early access version of the California Water Accounting, Tracking, and Reporting System (CalWATRS), which will replace eWRIMS, in July 2025. Early access will allow for feedback and refinements. In October 2025, CalWATRS will open for its first round of annual water use reporting. Information is available at waterboards.ca.gov/upward/calwatrs.

Supply & Demand Assessment: The Division of Water Rights continues to develop water supply models, water demand datasets, and water allocation tools for selected watersheds across California. Staff are actively engaging with agencies, partners, water users, and other interested parties to share information on the Supply and Demand Assessment Program and the models and tools that are under development.

In the past month, staff met with Marin Municipal Water District (May 16, 2025) regarding the Tomales-Drakes Bays watershed, Solano County Water Agency (June 4, 2025) at Monticello Dam regarding the Putah Creek watershed, the Russian River Water Sharing Program (June 5, 2025) regarding the Russian River watershed, the Trinity River Restoration Program (June 9, 2025) regarding the Trinity River watershed, and the County of San Luis Obispo and San Luis Obispo Basin Groundwater Sustainability Agency (June 11, 2025) regarding the Pismo Creek watershed.

Permitting and Enforcement Branch

Water Right Permits: In June 2025, the Division of Water Rights issued one permit. See table below for more details of the permit issued.

Bay-Delta and Hearings Branch

Rulemaking for Revisions to Measurement and Reporting Regulation (SB 88) – Comment Period: On May 22, 2025, the Division of Water Rights released updated proposed regulation text, based on comments received during the previous public comment period. Comments were accepted through June 6, 2025.

Staff proposed updated revisions to California Code of Regulations, title 23, chapters 2 (Appropriation of Water), 2.7 (Water Diversion and Use Reports), and 2.8 (Measuring and Monitoring) that further clarify regulation text and refine definitions, extend deadlines for completing forms, clarify review processes, revise alternative compliance requirements, and remove reference to reporting in water right priority. Staff will review comments and make additional revisions available for public comment prior to Board adoption. Water Quality Certification, Cannabis, Data Modernization, Water Supply & Demand, Instream Flows, Administrative, and Reporting Branch

Scott River and Shasta River Watersheds:

The State Water Board's current emergency regulation for the Scott and Shasta River Watersheds is in effect through January 26, 2026.

<u>Curtailments</u>: Curtailments in the Scott River watershed and the Shasta River watershed remain suspended as of mid-June 2025 with flows in both watersheds above the minimum flow requirements. Heading into summer, staff will continue monitoring conditions in both watersheds and share updates via the Board's <u>Scott River and Shasta River watersheds webpage</u> and "Scott-Shasta Drought & Flow Efforts" email list.

<u>Longer Term Efforts</u>: On June 7, 2025, Division staff presented an update on modeling efforts in the Scott River and Shasta River watersheds at a meeting of the Klamath Basin Monitoring Program (KBMP). A recording of the presentation is available from KBMP <u>here</u>. Later this year, staff plan to release for public review and comment draft models and model reports for both watersheds.

French Meadows Campground Rehabilitation Project: On June 3, 2025, the Executive Director issued a <u>water quality certification</u> for Placer County Water Agency's French Meadows Campground Rehabilitation Project (Project). The Project involves updates to the French Meadows Campground to meet United States Forest Service accessibility standards. The updates include replacing eight drainage culverts, installing one new drainage culvert, and removing two small footbridges.

Sediment Management Practices at Democrat Dam for the Kern River No. 1
Hydroelectric Project: On June 5, 2025, the Executive Director issued a
water quality certification for Southern California Edison Company's Sediment
Management Practices at Democrat Dam for the Kern River No. 1 Hydroelectric Project
(Project). The Project will facilitate ongoing sediment management practices at
Democrat Dam (located on the Kern River) and prevent silting of the impoundment.

Nevada Irrigation District's Yuba Bear Hydroelectric Project: On June 12, 2025, State Water Board released, for public comment, a draft water quality certification for Nevada Irrigation District's Yuba Bear Hydroelectric Project (Project) Federal Energy Regulatory Commission relicensing. In addition to continued operation of the Project for 50 years, Nevada Irrigation District proposes to: (1) expand the existing Rollins Development to add the Rollins No. 2 Powerhouse, which will increase the Project's power generation capacity from 79.32 to 90.72 megawatts; (2) add five new streamflow gages; and (3) replace, upgrade, or install new recreation facilities. The Project's draft water quality certification is available on the Project's webpage (https://www.waterboards.ca.gov/waterrights/water_issues/programs/water_quality_cert/yubabear_ferc2266.html).

Kanaka Hydroelectric Project: On June 19, 2025, State Water Board released, for public review and comment, a draft water quality certification for STS Hydroelectric LLC's Removal and Decommissioning of the Kanaka Powerhouse for the Kanaka Hydroelectric Project (Project) Federal Energy Regulatory Commission License Surrender .The Project is located on Sucker Run Creek, a tributary of South Fork Feather River that discharges directly into Lake Oroville. The Project involves the removal or decommissioning in place of the various components of the Kanaka Hydroelectric Project, with FERC License surrender the ultimate goal of the Project. The Projects' draft water quality certification is available on the Division of Water Rights' water quality certifications program webpage (https://waterboards.ca.gov/waterrights/water issues/programs/water quality cert/).

DIVISION OF WATER QUALITY

Oil and Gas Monitoring Program

On May 16, 2025, State Water Board staff issued to the California Geologic Energy Management Division (CalGEM) a <u>preliminary concurrence letter</u> for an aquifer exemption proposal to expand the aquifer exemption for oil-bearing portions of the Kern River and Chanac Formations below the 'C' (Capping) Silt in the Kern River Oil Field for Class II injection. The revised aquifer exemption proposal dated March 26, 2025, was reviewed in consultation with Central Valley Regional Water Quality Control Board staff and has been determined to meet both federal and state criteria. This preliminary concurrence is pending the upcoming two public comment processes anticipated to take place over the next year. More information regarding aquifer exemption reviews can be found on CalGEM's Aquifer Exemptions webpage.

Irrigated Lands Regulatory Program Update: The Irrigated Lands Regulatory reports are included in Appendix A of this report.

Sewer System Administrator Appointment for East Orosi CSD

On June 11, 2025, the Executive Director of the State Water Board adopted Resolution No. 2025-0017-EXEC, Identifying the East Orosi Community Services District (East Orosi CSD) as a Designated Sewer System in Need of an Administrator, and Water Quality Order No. 2025-0038-EXEC, Appointing Tulare County, Resources Management Agency, As a Full-Scope Administrator for East Orosi CSD. In August 2025, the State Water Board will certify its funding agreement with Tulare County RMA to execute funding for this project. Tulare County RMA is required within 120 days of appointment to submit to the State Water Board a Community Accountability and Engagement Plan and Post-Administrator Plan, with subsequent public engagement hosted by the administrator - Tulare County RMA. Minimum meeting and engagement requirements are outlined in the Division of Financial Assistance Administrator Policy Handbook. University Enterprises Incorporated – PFAS Sampling Program

This program provides technical assistance to water systems for collecting and analyzing drinking water well samples for Per-and Polyfluoroalkyl Substances (PFAS) at all wells serving disadvantaged communities and severely disadvantaged communities, as required by State Water Board Order DW 2024-0002-DDW. Sampling and analysis services are provided by University Enterprises Incorporated, Office of Water Programs and their partners at no cost to the water systems. All drinking water wells will be sampled at least once. A second round of sampling will be decided by the State Water Board after the first round of sampling is complete. To date, 100% of eligible water systems (1,140 of 1,140) are registered to be sampled and 2,077 wells out of the 3,655 scheduled have been sampled.

The CWSRF Intended Use Plan (IUP) was released on May 31, 2025. On June 17, 2025, the State Water Resources Control Board (State Water Board) conducted a workshop to provide information on the IUP, engage with the public, and solicit public comments in preparation for its anticipated adoption on August 5, 2025.

DWSRF Future Significant Events

Intended Use Plan (Board Workshop)

Staff plan to release the proposed DWSRF Intended Use Plan (IUP) at the end of June 2025 and a Board Workshop to receive public comments is tentatively planned for July 2025.

Annual Report

Staff are now preparing the SFY 2024/25 Annual Report.

Technical Assistance – Lead Service Line Inventory

Through the U.S. EPA in-kind services, CDM Smith continues to provide technical assistance to community water systems (CWS) completing the initial lead service line inventory as required by the Lead and Copper Rule Revisions. Priority is being given to community water systems with 500 service connections or less serving disadvantaged communities (DAC). Applications for Lead Service Line (LSL) technical assistance are being accepted on a continuous basis. Currently, 139 eligible systems have received or are currently receiving assistance from CDM Smith for conducting, reviewing, and submitting their LSL inventories to DDW.

Projects for small, disadvantaged communities receiving principal forgiveness or grant funding are listed in the OSWS Section of this report.

DFA staff meet monthly to discuss progress of reviews and estimated project funding agreement execution. The State Water & Wastewater Infrastructure Forecasting Tool (SWWIFT) is updated monthly based on input from staff and used to track staff's overall progress towards funding projects on the Fundable List.

Water Recycling Funding Program (WRFP)

The Safe Drinking Water, Wildfire Prevention, Drought Preparedness, and Clean Air Bond Act of 2024 (Proposition 4 or the Climate Bond), approved by voters in November 2024, authorizes \$10 billion to protect communities and nature from the impacts of climate change, such as drought, flooding, wildfire, extreme heat, and sea level rise; to reduce or remove carbon pollution where possible; and in some cases address existing environmental challenges exacerbated by climate change. Approximately \$386 million of the authorization was approved for water reuse and recycling projects. The WRFP

will use its current guidelines to award and implement existing projects. The Proposition 4 language also required the WRFP to develop guidance for large-scale projects. Staff incorporated large-scale project eligibilities and guidance in the draft 2025-26 Intended Use Plan.

Water Supply Strategy (WSS) (Action 1.1 – Reuse at least 800,000 acre-feet of water per year by 2030 and 1.8 million acre-feet by 2040) Update

The SFY 2024-25 CWSRF Intended Use Plan was adopted on August 6, 2024, and includes grant maximums for the Water Recycling Funding Program. The Governor's Proposed Budget for SFY 2025-26 proposes to reduce water recycling general fund appropriations by \$51 million. Staff will continue to encumber and fund project applications as they are ready to proceed and as additional funds through Proposition 4 become available.

DIVISION OF DRINKING WATER

Permits

Permits are issued when a public water system undertakes action that impacts public health (i.e. a new source of supply, modifying treatment or adding a large distribution reservoir), when the original permit has numerous amendments, or following new regulations or conditions that DDW deems necessary for the protection of public health.

Tribally-centered Fish Consumption Application In Development

The <u>SWAMP Bioaccumulation Monitoring Program</u> is in the very early phases of developing an interactive and user-friendly application that includes and contextualizes bioaccumulation monitoring data, consumption thresholds, advisories, and guidance associated with fish consumption and human health. The application will be tailored to the needs of California Tribal users who consume fish for subsistence and/or cultural purposes.

The project leads will be using the <u>app that provides culturally tailored fish consumption guidelines for the Anishinaabe</u> (Ojibwe and associated Great Lakes Tribes) as inspiration and plan on assembling a California Tribal Advisory Committee (TAC) to inform the development of the application. Development of the application for California will take place over the next three years.

The goal is to assemble the TAC and begin meeting by October 2025. The frequency and format of TAC meetings will depend on TAC members' interest and availability. TAC members will be asked to provide guidance related to application development decisions, features, and functionality as well as supporting the early review of the application when it is available.

FHAB pre-Memorial Day Holiday Assessment

The Freshwater and Estuarine Harmful Algal Bloom (FHAB) Program conducted the pre-Memorial holiday assessments for 2025. Sixty-nine sites were sampled across the state by Regional Water Boards, partners, cities, counties, and tribes.

- Fourteen waterbodies were issued caution advisory
- One waterbody was issued a warning advisory
- Four waterbodies were issued a danger advisory
- One waterbody issued a general awareness advisory
- Three waterbodies were issued a toxic algae alert advisory

All other waterbodies tested were not issued advisories for a harmful algal bloom presence. The Fourth of July pre-holiday assessment is scheduled from 6/10-6/24. All information from these pre-holiday assessments is published to the <u>HAB web map</u>.

Water Conservation

The response rate for the **April 2025** Urban Water Conservation Report is 89% as of the writing of this report (369 reports submitted). The estimated total production (accounting for missing reports) is 129.8 billion gallons (398.4 thousand acre-feet), and the statewide residential use is 67 gallons per capita per day.

For May 2025, the <u>Save Water</u> site received 201 water waste reports.

June 2025

This month's Irrigated Lands Regulatory Program (ILRP) update provides a summary of significant activities of State Water Board staff for the month of May 2025; and the North Coast, San Francisco Bay, Central Coast, Los Angeles, Lahontan, Colorado River Basin, Santa Ana, and San Diego Regional Water Quality Control Boards (Regional Water Boards) from April 1, 2025, to May 31, 2025. Next month's report will discuss activities of the Central Valley Regional Water Board's recent program activities and up to date data on compliance and outreach activities.

State Water Board staff continued work with California State University, Sacramento, to convene an expert panel, as discussed in Order No. WQ 2023-0081, In the Matter of Review of General Waste Discharge Requirements for Discharges from Irrigated Lands Order No. R3-2021-0040. The panel selection process is almost complete following extensive targeted outreach. The first public meeting is expected to be held this summer. Staff are working internally with the Office of Information Management and Analysis (OIMA) to conduct further data analysis on reported Irrigation and Nitrogen Management Plans (INMP) and will provide the results to the panel. Staff are encouraging the public to sign up for the email list located on Agriculture webpage, which will distribute panel updates and information on public meetings.

State Water Board staff continued coordination with the California Department of Food and Agriculture (CDFA) contractor on the CDFA regulatory alignment study. By November 2025, a report will be presented detailing the final regulatory alignment recommendations.

San Francisco Bay Regional Water Board staff are updating program enrollment, invoicing, and Farm Plan information. Staff are also processing new enrollments and terminations, contacting and assisting new responsible parties, and resolving other issues as they arise.

Los Angeles Regional Water Board staff met with the Ventura County Agricultural Irrigated Lands Group (VCAILG) and their consultants to discuss implementation and next steps for Order No. R4-2023-0353, Waste Discharge Requirements for Discharges from Irrigated Agricultural Lands Within The Los Angeles Region (2023 Ag Order). Staff also met with the Los Angeles Irrigated Lands Group (LAILG) to discuss implementation and next steps for the 2023 Ag Order and compliance with the Ground Water Monitoring Trend requirements.

On April 15, 2025, Los Angeles Water Board staff held "office hours" from 10:00am – 4:30pm at the Farm Bureau for individual growers to ask parcel-specific questions on Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) compliance. Staff are planning to host more office hours and a workshop on TMDL discharge limitations Monitoring and Reporting Plan development in the coming months. The deadline for growers to submit a completed

Notice of Intent regarding TMDL compliance path was on April 24, 2025. Los Angeles Water Board staff are currently inventorying the submitted responses.

At the June 26, 2025, Los Angeles Water Board meeting, VCAILG will present an informational item on their ClearWater member portal that has been developed to help facilitate implementation of the 2023 Ag Order.

Colorado River Basin Regional Water Board staff met with Palo Verde Outfall Coalition to discuss technical and compliance issues in Palm Desert on May 5, 2025.

Staff revised the Monitoring and Reporting Program of the agricultural Order R7-2019-0030-05 on May 7, 2025, for the submission deadlines of nitrogen coefficients. The extension was requested by the Palo Verde Outfall Coalition to ensure consistency across coalitions and allow adequate time for coefficient development.

There were no significant program updates reported in the **North Coast**, **Central Coast**, **Lahontan**, **Santa Ana** and **San Diego Regional Water Boards** from April 1, 2025, to May 31, 2025.
