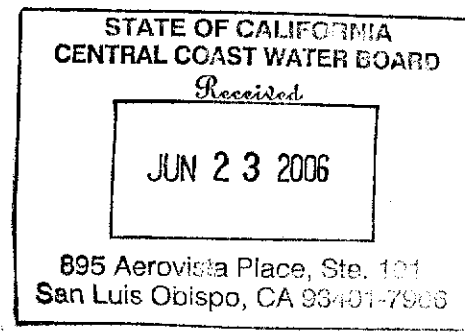



The PTF should be punished for their poor judgment, not rewarded or allowed to submit new materials of any kind. Using an insider lawyer and then getting caught is shameful and shows that they didn't do their homework to check the legal ramifications of their actions.

The State Board's own attorney, Mr. Young's right-hand-man on the panel, should have stopped the hearing at that time, following the CSD's request for dismissal. Since Mr. Young decided to continue with the preceding then the PTF's case should stand as is, illegally presented and based on hypothesis' collected by thirty years of state sponsored "prosecution task forcing" instead of state sponsored "solution teams". No wonder we are in this mess! While Roger Briggs and his team have been on this since 1983, I've only been a homeowner for just over two years now. The threat of CDO's is not helping our quality of life or making my family feel like our government is looking out for its people.
