**SUBJECT:** Enforcement Actions and Priorities for Fiscal Year 2019/20 –

Summary Report

**DISCUSSION:** This item summarizes penalty enforcement actions for fiscal year (FY)

2018/19, including the issuance and/or settlement of administrative civil liability (ACL) complaints. It also summarizes compliance assistance the Board's enforcement section provided to regulatory programs, public outreach

for enforcement, and enforcement priorities for FY 2019/20.

#### **Penalties Imposed**

During FY 2018/19, we resolved 57 penalty assessment cases. The Board adopted penalties totaling \$1,511,500 (see Tables A1 through A4). Another complaint, involving \$88,000 in proposed penalties, remains unresolved (see Table A5). These cases addressed various problems, such as unauthorized discharges of chlorinated water, sanitary sewer overflows, violations of discharge limits and other permit requirements, and failure to submit annual reports of stormwater discharge. The penalty assessments were consistent with the State Water Board's Enforcement Policy and, as applicable, its Supplemental Environmental Project (SEP) Policy.

#### Table A1 – Prior FY ACL Cases Settled in FY 2018/19

We settled one complaint issued in the prior fiscal year through a stipulated order imposing a \$600,000 penalty. The settlement provided that \$300,000 of the penalty would be spent on an Enhanced Compliance Action (ECA) to increase wet weather storage at the facility.

#### Table A2 – ACL Cases Initiated and Settled in FY 2018/19

We settled 8 cases through stipulated orders imposing total penalties of \$737,500. The settlements provided that \$376,250 of the penalties would be spent on SEPs and Enhanced Compliance Actions (ECAs). Of the \$300,150 set aside for SEPs, \$213,000 funded San Francisco Bay Regional Monitoring Program (RMP) projects and \$87,150 funded other SEPs. The remaining \$76,100 funded ECAs.

#### ■ Table A3 – FY 2018/19 Mandatory Minimum Penalties (NPDES)

We settled 21 cases involving NPDES permit effluent limit violations subject to mandatory minimum penalties of \$3,000 each. The stipulated orders imposed total penalties of \$147,000. The settlements provided that \$72,000 of the penalties would be spent on SEPs funding RMP projects.

#### ■ Table A4 – FY 2018/19 Industrial Stormwater Permit Coverage

We settled 27 cases involving dischargers not submitting annual reports required by the State Water Board's industrial and construction stormwater general permits. Such violations are subject to mandatory minimum penalties of \$1,000 each. The stipulated orders imposed total penalties of \$27,000. The settlements provided that \$2,000 of the penalties would be spent on SEPs funding RMP projects.

#### ■ Table A5 – ACL Complaints in Settlement Discussions

As of the end of FY 2018/2019 (June 30, 2019), enforcement staff continued to pursue settlement of one complaint issued for a proposed penalty of \$88,000.

Staff continue working on some enforcement cases after the Board imposes a penalty or refers a case to the Office of Attorney General. We oversee implementation of projects on penalty settlements that include an SEP or ECA, and we assist the Office of Attorney General in court litigation and mediation.

#### **Compliance Assistance**

Enforcement and stormwater program staff collaborated during FY 2018/19 to enforce the annual reporting requirements of the State Water Board's industrial and construction stormwater general permits. We targeted 143 industrial facilities and 309 construction sites that did not submit annual reports by deadlines for the FY 2016/17 reporting year, and 107 industrial facilities and 192 construction sites that did not meet the deadline for the FY 2017/18 reporting year. Permit enrollees received notices of noncompliance in accordance with Stormwater Enforcement Act procedures (California Water Code sections 13399.31 and 33), and staff worked with enrollees to encourage report submittal and avoid mandatory penalties for noncompliance. As of the end of the fiscal year, fewer than 10 percent of the targeted enrollees had to pay a mandatory penalty (the penalties paid are listed in Table A4).

#### **Public Outreach**

Our notification of pending enforcement actions to the regulated community and the public is an integral part of our enforcement program. In addition to providing documents to interested parties and stakeholders by mail and email, anyone can obtain information about our enforcement cases by <u>subscribing</u> to an email list for enforcement items, checking the current status of <u>enforcement cases</u> and accessing documents on our website, and/or following <u>press releases</u> issued on significant proposed actions through the State Water Board's <u>Office of Public Affairs</u>.

Additional enforcement-related information is also available on the websites of the <u>State Water Board</u> and San Francisco Estuary Partnership. The <u>San Francisco Estuary Partnership</u> website lists current and completed SEPs, including the status of pending projects and links to associated documents.

#### **Enforcement Priorities**

Our enforcement priorities for FY 2019/20 will generally be focused on egregious violations with the highest adverse water quality impacts, followed

by violations that threaten the integrity of the Board's requirements. These include discharges that result in fish kills or other acute aquatic impacts; illegal fill of streams or wetlands, including violations at permitted stream or wetland projects; violations of site cleanup requirements; and violations of construction, industrial, and municipal stormwater permits. We will continue to prioritize enforcement of sanitary sewer overflows, particularly from agencies with inadequate sewer infrastructure rehabilitation programs. We will also continue to maintain a near-zero backlog of mandatory minimum penalty assessments.

Consistent with the State Water Board's Enforcement Policy, we prioritize enforcement efforts at internal enforcement staff meetings held monthly with the assistant executive officers, division chiefs, and program staff, where we discuss potential enforcement cases that our regulatory programs suggest and potential cases that come from our complaint hotline, the CalEPA Complaint System, State Office of Emergency Services spill reports, and enforcement task force meetings. Factors we weigh in prioritizing cases include our current workload and case-specific factors, such as discharger compliance history, strength of evidence, magnitude of water quality impact, threat to high-priority watersheds, discharger culpability, and possible mitigating circumstances.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>2</sup> \$158,000 of the penalty will go toward an RMP SEP for a suspended sediment flux study in the Lower South Bay to support the South Bay Salt Ponds Restoration Project and improve understanding of the transport of sediment-associated contaminants.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>3</sup> \$37,500 of the penalty will go to the California-Nevada Section of the American Water Works Association to update, publicize, and provide training workshops on the *Best Management Practices Manual for Drinking Water System Releases*.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>4</sup> \$13,400 of the penalty will go toward enhancing monitoring of sewage levels and flows within the City of Half Moon Bay's collection system to evaluate inflow and infiltration and alerting personnel before sanitary sewer overflows occur.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>5</sup> \$15,000 of the penalty will go toward an RMP SEP for a study of polychlorinated biphenyls (PCBs) loads in stormwater in the San Leandro Bay Watershed.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>6</sup> \$16,050 of the penalty will go toward enhancing monitoring of sewage levels within the Montara Water and Sanitary District's collection system and alerting personnel before sanitary sewer overflows occur.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>7</sup> \$60,050 of the penalty will go toward enhancing chlorine monitoring of water in the East Bay Municipal Utility District's distribution system and reservoirs.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>8</sup> \$40,000 of the penalty will go toward an RMP SEP for a clam and water selenium monitoring study in support of the Total Maximum Daily Load for Selenium in the North Bay.
