Dear Members of the State Water Resources Control Board:

I am sending this letter in support of the proposed Resolution that instructs SWRCB staff to develop a state Policy to Protect Wetlands and Riparian Areas. I have a deep interest in preserving wetlands and riparian habitat and am a Sierra Club member and a docent at the Fitzgerald Marine Reserve in Moss Beach.

Comment Letter: SWRCB Resolution 2008 - Resolution to Develop a Policy to Protect Wetlands and Riparian

As the proposed Resolution states, over 90 percent of historic wetlands and 85 percent of riparian acreage has been fost to development. California cannot afford to lose any more wetlands or riparian areas. Several years have already clapsed since the reduction of federal wetlands protection. I urge the State Water Board to vote Yes on the resolution with the following added provisions that would require more protection at a faster pace:

- The State Water Board should instruct the staff to develop a policy that requires avoidance of wetland losses, with mitigation only allowed after all feasible avoidance alternatives have been exhausted. 1.
- In view of the immediate and continuing losses of wetlands and riparian habitat and to avoid any losses while studying Phase 2 and Phase 3, an interim Phase 1 goal should be established to protect both wetlands 2. and riparian areas.
- Similarly, an interim Phase 1 goal should protect against development, in addition to fill and dredge 3. activities.
- There should be specified timelines for developing Phase 2 and Phase 3. 4.

Areas - Board Meeting Session - Division of Water Quality - March 18, 2008

The California definition of wetlands should include the entire suite of California wetlands such as saltwater and brackish water marshes, estuaries, riparian habitat and floodplains, vernal pools, swales, and 5. any area with hydrophitic plants and saturated soils.

California has always been a leader in taking the initiative in environmental matters. I greatly appreciate the Resolution's proposal to protect all waters of the state using a watershed approach.
