Use the following information as a guide to ensure Certification Letters provided have the essential elements to meet compliance requirements.

Key Elements of a Certification Letter

There are five (5) key elements in a certification letter:


- ❖ What is the product?
 - The letter should list the specific(s) delivered to the project site.
- Where was it made?
 - The letter should include the location(s) of the foundry/mill/factory where the product was manufactured (City and State).
- ❖ To Whom was it delivered?
 - The letter should include the name of the project and/or jurisdiction where the product was delivered.
- Signature of company representative
 - The letter should be on a company letterhead.
- * Reference AIS requirements
 - The letter should clearly indicate AIS requirements, especially if the letter references other domestic preference laws.

NOTE: Other "Buy American' letters do not work for EPA's AIS Requirement.

Common Mistakes in AIS Certification Letters

- ❖ Manufacturers not referencing specific project and product information
- Suppliers or customers relying on "Made in the USA" stampings or stickers as proof of AIS compliance
- Manufacturers misinforming suppliers or consultants on AIS certification requirements
- Manufacturers not referencing AIS requirements for the SRF
- Certification letters from suppliers instead of a manufacturer
